Letter from the CEO

When I was appointed interim executive director of the Minnesota AIDS Project in November, 2014, I had no idea that I would become Chief Executive Officer one year later. I am absolutely thrilled to lead MAP into the future; a future that I believe can enable us to be a national model in the urgent task of combatting HIV/AIDS.

In my 25 years as a nonprofit executive and consultant, I have had the opportunity to work with scores of nonprofit organizations. But not a single one has supported its mission with the energy, commitment, passion, and professionalism that I see at the Minnesota AIDS Project. The wonderful people I have the honor to lead are the reason I am overjoyed and excited to be the CEO of this amazing organization.

During my initial year at MAP, with the unwavering support of the Board of Directors and the outstanding accomplishments of our professional staff, we were able to:

- Complete the sale of our existing property at 1400 Park Avenue;
- Pay off our existing mortgage, substantially strengthen our balance sheet with the cash proceeds from the sale, and secure a favorable long-term lease to house our operations;
- Begin a comprehensive process to improve our financial management systems, our human resources practices and procedures, and our communication efforts; and,
- Establish a Transformation Task Force to begin the process of strategically repositioning our organization for long-term sustainability and success.

As 2016 unfolds, we are settled in our new headquarters at University Avenue and Highway 280 in St. Paul. We are very pleased with the result of our relocation, which was accomplished on time and under budget, and which provides an inviting and professional setting that has been well received by our clients and has brought our staff closer together.

Our priorities for 2016 include:

- Moving forward on a transformation plan that will set the stage for a 2017-2020 Strategic plan that will capitalize on our opportunities and respond to the challenges we face:
- Enhancing our fundraising and development activities to support long-term financial sustainability; and,
- Strengthening our presence as a local and statewide advocate and a national leader in the HIV/AIDS sector.

In pursuing our priorities, we will be focused on the quality of life of our thousands of individual clients and on an equal number of Minnesotans who are afflicted with HIV/AIDS, but have not yet been able to take advantage of our services. Both continue to be our reason for being.

I am so very grateful for the excellent support of our contributors and partners, the selfless and energetic support of our Board of Directors, and the superb work of our talented staff. We are making a major, positive contribution to our society and can look forward to an exceptional future together.

Letter from the Board

To be sure, 2015 was a year of change for the Minnesota AIDS Project. A significant change in leadership, the end of some programs and the creation of others, and an impending move after the sale of our building, were just a few of the changes in the last year. But in the midst of these changes, our dedicated staff continued to shine, our programs continued to change lives, and our clients continued to experience the support we've always provided.

Here are a few highlights:

Mainline, MAP's syringe exchange program, collected 337,187 used syringes and distributed 328,566 syringes to 5,245 people (see page 6). This is an astonishing amount of work and has very likely prevented many, many new HIV and Hepatitis C infections in Minnesota. Even more astonishing is the number of lives saved through the distribution of overdose prevention medication. We've been able to document more than 32 lives saved in 2015 through our overdose prevention efforts.

Our transitional housing program (THP) which assists people living with HIV who are at risk for or experiencing homelessness improved many lives not only with stable housing, but also education that will last a lifetime, as you'll see on page 5. On a 2015 survey of clients at intake and after graduating from the program, 29 percent of clients had learned important tools to navigating and maintaining stable housing. Together with the 55 percent of clients who had those skillsets when entering THP, we can say that 84 percent of our housing clients are prepared to transition to stable housing.

In 2015, the case management program which works alongside clients to break down barriers to HIV medical care saw incredible outcomes as 91 percent of our clients achieved viral suppression compared to just 63 percent of people living with HIV statewide. The national numbers are even lower at 30 percent in 2011, the most recent date that data is available. Viral suppression is crucial to the health and well-being of our community, as you'll see on page 7.

These examples are but a few among the amazing stories of the work that was accomplished during a time of transition. To me, this is a testament to the dedication and passion our staff have for this work. It's also a testament to the generosity of those who have supported the work of the Minnesota AIDS Project over the last year.

On behalf of MAP, thank you to those who have given financially and those who have donated your time to helping us lead Minnesota's fight to stop HIV in 2015.





Services Profile Transitional Housing


People living with HIV who are experiencing homelessness or are at risk for homelessness are confronted with a huge barrier to maintaining their health. The Transitional Housing Program works to not only remove that barrier in the short term, but also works with clients to ensure that stable housing continues throughout their lives. A key component is education

MAP's housing program works with landlords and clients to ensure stable, affordable housing is accessible to people living with HIV with low or no incomes. Thanks to funding from the Rvan White Care Act, the Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS, and donations from our supporters, we are able to subsidize housing for people living with HIV and also provide education on the legal aspects of renting, renters' rights and responsibilities, and how to work effectively with landlords.

Housing clients demonstrated an increase in knowledge through the Transitional **Housing Program**



On a 2015 survey of clients at intake and after completing the program, 29 percent of clients had learned important tools to navigate and maintain stable housing. Together with the 55 percent of clients who had those skillsets when entering THP, we can say that 84 percent of our housing clients had the knowledge necessary to successfully maneuver the housing rental market.

Services Profile Syringe Exchange

Every day, people from around the state come to MAP to get unused syringes. Many receive up to 200 syringes to bring back to their communities to ensure their friends. family, and even strangers have the tools to prevent the spread of HIV. In addition to accessing syringes, our clients get information on HIV testing, get linked to chemical dependency treatment, receive education on harm reduction, and have access to Naloxone, a life-saving drug used to reverse overdoses.

Over the last five years, Mainline's client base has doubled with our staff seeing more than 30 clients a day and more than 300,000 used syringes disposed of. There has been a 111 percent increase in the number of clients since 2010.

In 2015, Mainline collected 337,187 used syringes and distributed 328,566 unused syringes to 5,245 people. The program had a 103 percent return rate meaning we collected more used syringes than we distributed unused ones.

An important aspect of Mainline's work involves the distribution of Naloxone and education around its use. Naloxone is a tool to help reverse an opioid overdose. In 2015, we were able to document 32 lives saved through our overdose prevention efforts.

Services Profile Case Management

Medical Case Management is one of the most effective tools we have to ensure people living with HIV live long and healthy lives, and that HIV transmission is reduced. Our case managers link people living with HIV with needed resources such as HIV medical care, housing, transportation, financial assistance, legal services, and a range of other needs. The goal is to assist clients in maintaining their connection with medical care and ensure that they are able to obtain and take HIV medication. In 2015, that goal led to outstanding outcomes.

Viral suppression is a measure of how many particles of virus are present in the blood, and it's an important measure. Viral suppression means that HIV disease is largely halted, and that the possibility of transmission has become remote. Of the clients we have data for. 90.7 percent had achieved viral suppression.

This is a huge success for our case management program. In 2014, the most recent year that data is available, only 63 percent of people living with HIV statewide had achieved viral suppression. Our case managers are working hard to achieve MAP's vision of a Minnesota where new HIV infections are eliminated and people living with HIV experience long, healthy lives.

Benefits Counseling

Benefits Counseling fielded 1,285 inquiries about navigating the complexities of the public and private health care system. Those inquiries came mainly from people living with HIV but also HIV service providers. The program also successfully connected 222 people living with HIV to the state's Ryan White Care Act services. Benefits Counseling also held 13 trainings to help professionals and people living with HIV better understand the health care system.

Legal Services

Legal Services served 325 individual clients in 400 matters through a full range of legal services including direct representation, brief services, advice, information, referrals to other legal services agencies, and responding to questions from providers regarding their clients. We also served 15 non-HIV positive clients in 20 cases through our Medical Legal Partnership and social security services.



AIDSLine

In 2015, the AIDSLine answered 3,913 calls, emails, text messages, and online chats with information about HIV prevention and services. Knowledge helps people understand HIV risk, reduces stigma, and helps people make safe and informed choices.

MAP's Chemical Health Services conducted Rule 25 assessments for 114 people which helped them access public addiction treatment services. MAP's chemical health staff also counseled 130 people, referred 173 to treatment, and helped 99 plan their treatment aftercare plans.
